


Adult New Reader Books 2

Partners in this project include Sacramento Public Library, Learning Quest - Stanislaus Literacy Centers and ProLiteracy (Education Network).

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
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
Rosa works on the river. She is a river guide.



She loves the sun. It is warm. She loves the water. It is cool.




It is a fun job. Rosa takes people on her raft.

The rapids are big. They are strong. This big rapid is called Skull Rapid.




Rosa's raft goes into the rapid.

Rosa pulls people from the water. People are scared. But they are safe. $\,$




People help turn the raft over.

We saw only one car in 10 miles or so.




In the dark, we used my 2 spotlights to see a long way down the road.

You smell the burn of rubber.


You feel the tires spin

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


It is late. It is time for bed.












I look at my bed and it is nice.

I turn on the light.




I get out of bed to see what it is.
